- LIT / Lit Grad Curriculum Rep (Larissa):
 - Final literature speaker for the guest speaker series was today. Dr. Medovoi
 encouraged us to let literature faculty know what guest speakers we would
 like in a lineup for next semester. (You can either let Larissa know at

 - This relates back to a point raised in a literature faculty meeting previously. A critique was raised previously by Stephanie Brown that our speakers so far have been white and male. Dr. Medovoi says he would welcome ideas from others for ideas for new speakers that would align with program interests, and this definitely includes ideas from graduate students.
 - Not a program announcement but just a reminder from me: be on the lookout for award, grant, and conference applications as some are due in early January and February.

 - Assessment
 - A few RCTE students met with Matthew and Stephanie to talk about creating an assessment process and gave feedback on the assessment process. Here are the meeting notes from that conversation.

- SLAT Rep (Name):

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- Undergrad Curriculum Rep (Matt):
 - Proposal to remove prereqs/recommendations/instructor approval for several Lit/GE courses. Several 200/300 level classes sometimes taught/TA'd by grad students are on the list (373A/B for example), so this may potentially impact future opportunities for grad teaching due to greater enrollment (i.e. more opportunities).
 - New course proposals:

ENGL 232: Early Modern Lit: Crossing the Color-Line Replaces ENGL 229. No preregs, GE course.

ENGL 178: Rise of Modern Fantasy

GE course, ultra-large enrollment (100+ students).

ENGL 162: Anger and Resentment in the Age of Trump Refresh of ENGL 160D1. Already approved as GE course. 178 is obviously off the table for grad teachers due to class size; unsure of potential future availability of others. Concerns were brought up by Steph Brown about some of the language used in explaining the Eurocentric nature of 178 (i.e. that there are explicitly no black fantasy authors in the proposed syllabus). Concerns were brought up by Paul Hurh and Steph Brown about the topicality of 162 and the potential for national attention as the current title is something of a flashpoint, and because it will impact long-term viability of the course (side note: it seems somewhat irresponsible to me not to discuss the first point in more depth, particularly considering the shooting we had recently).

New Concerns & Homework:

- ONGOING: Remind people of travel, research, professional development, and other funding with low-stakes application processes!
 - EGU Travel Awards for "official university business" travel up to \$500 to cover costs of presenting work at a conference
 - English Graduate Student Research Fund up to \$500 for research travel/field work. Money can no longer be used for local research costs as of Spring 2022 (including buying books, transcription software, etc.)
 - GPSC Travel, Research, and Professional Development grants three separate applications for different types of opportunities; up to \$750 for eligible research travel or research project costs, up to \$1500 for eligible Professional Development costs
 - GPSC Basic Needs Microgrant up to \$200 "to alleviate some of the financial burden students might be experiencing by helping cover healthcare, academic, hygiene, childcare, transportation, and/or housing-related essential costs;" four deadlines throughout year; awarded on first-come, first-serve basis via lottery selection
